Executive Summary

About Salem Health Hospitals and Clinics

Salem Health Hospitals and Clinics has been the region's leader in locally controlled health care since 1895, providing the community with award-winning care for generations. Salem Health facilities include Salem Hospital, West Valley Hospital in Dallas and Salem Health Medical and Specialty Clinics throughout the mid-Willamette Valley. Salem Health collectively serves both Marion and Polk Counties while also providing high quality, sought after care to those in the surrounding counties of Linn, Benton, Lincoln and Yamhill.

Salem Hospital is the largest hospital in Oregon and operates the busiest emergency department between Seattle and San Francisco, with more than 105,000 visits in 2022. West Valley Hospital, Salem Health's critical access hospital is a top performing critical access hospital which offers emergency services, swing beds and specialty care close to home for those living in rural Polk County. In July 2022, a new inpatient building opened on the Salem campus, adding 150 of those beds to meet the current and growing need. Construction is currently underway for an additional 19 beds at West Valley, scheduled to open in June 2023.

Our mission is to improve the health and well-being of the people and communities we serve. We are proud to partner with the best physicians in the region to bring exceptional and compassionate care to our region.

Collaborative Approach

More than providing exceptional care, Salem Health is dedicated to being a steadfast and thoughtful partner to the communities we serve, impacting health outcomes through a multitude of collaborations. We strive to demonstrate our commitment by focusing our efforts and resources in the areas of highest need.

In order to determine this focus, Salem Health partners with public health, providers, civic groups and community based organizations throughout Marion and Polk counties to publish the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). Partners include Marion County Health & Human Services, Polk County Health Department, PacificSource Community Health Solutions, Santiam Hospital, Legacy Health Silverton, Kaiser Permanente, Behavioral Care Network, Chemeketa Community College, Northwest Senior & Disability Services, Western Oregon University, Early Learning HUB and Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency.

The collaborative approach used to complete the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP), a multi-phase, evidenced-based framework created by the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO). The MAPP process casts a wide net to collect both qualitative and quantitative data aiding in better understanding the local health landscape and why health conditions occur. As a result, three main priority areas for the community were identified:

- Substance use and prevention
- Housing
- Behavioral health support

The collaborative also develops a five year Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) to outline strategies to address these priority areas throughout the Marion and Polk region. Each partner adopts and works toward the strategies they believe they can impact and goals and outcomes are gathered and reported collectively. This plan is currently under development and is expected to be published in June 2023.

Our Impact

Since the 2019 CHNA, Salem Health has continued to provide funding, staff capacity and other resources towards the identified areas in addition to the overlapping priority impacting all of us, COVID-19. Following the introduction of the COVID-19 vaccine in January 2021, Salem Health stood up the first mass vaccination clinic in the state and also initiated a mobile vaccine clinic to connect and provide access to vaccines for members of our BIPOC communities. While the worst of the pandemic has passed, Salem Hospital continues to admit and care for patients with corona virus. In 2022 alone, 2,045 patients testing positive for COVID-19 were admitted and cared for at Salem Hospital.

The following pages outline the impact Salem Hospital and West Valley Hospital made from July 2021 – June 2022 as strategic investments were made to enable Salem Health to allocate resources toward services, outreach, prevention, education and wellness opportunities where the greatest impact can be realized.

HOUSING

Housing and access to health care considered social determinants of health because they can have a significant impact on one's health, particularly if they are lacking.

Access to affordable housing and access to health care are two vital building blocks toward stability.

Goal: Support initiatives that create access to affordable housing and create avenues to citizens to access health care services.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

The prevalence of mental health risk factors within our communities is rising. 1 in 4 adults have been diagnosed with depression while the suicide mortality rate is increasing in Marion and Polk counties. Mental health is an important part of overall health and well-being.

Goal: Support health care navigation and other prevention services delivered in trauma informed practices to positively impact children, youth, and adult seeking to improve their behavioral health.
