Ethical Implications of Qualitative Research

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"Did we get the story right?"

- Characteristics of a "good" qualitative study
 - Employed rigorous data collection procedures.
 - Framed study within philosophical assumptions of the qualitative approach to research.
 - Used a tradition of inquiry.
 - Began with a single focus toward understanding – not causality.

- Study included detailed and rigorous methods to data collection and analysis.
 Report writing is persuasive, as if the reader "was there".
- Data were analyzed using multiple levels of abstraction – codes, categories, concepts.
- Findings are believable and credible.
- Writing is clear, engaging and reflects the complexities that exist in real life.
